5. Action on a Resolution Supporting the 2020 Safety Performance Measures, and Target Setting

Purpose

The purpose of this agenda item is to take action on a resolution supporting the federally required 2020 safety performance measures.

Issue

The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) has implemented several roadway-related performance requirements created under MAP-21 and the FAST Act. The Transportation Policy Board (TPB) took action in January 2019 (as well as in 2018) supporting statewide 2019 targets developed by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and a comprehensive group of traffic safety stakeholders. The TPB will continue to need to take action supporting new statewide targets or set regional targets yearly.

Safety performance measures focus on reducing the number of people killed and seriously injured in motorized and non-motorized crashes. By reporting targets in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan and Transportation Improvement Program, performance measures can inform planning and funding decisions in the pursuit of regional and national goals.

At their respective meetings on November 13 and November 20, the Bicycle Mobility Advisory Committee and Pedestrian Mobility Advisory Committee took action on recommendations for 2020 targets.

This item was resented at your December meeting and the presentation from that meeting is attached for your information.

TAC unanimously recommended approval of the attached resolution.

Action Requested

A motion to approval the resolution outlining safety targets for 2020 as well as supporting TxDOT's goals of zero crash fatalities by year 2050 and halving the serious injuries from crashes by year 2035.



A Resolution Adopting the Safety Targets Established by the Texas Department of Transportation for Year 2020

DRAFT

WHEREAS, the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is responsible for a multi-modal transportation planning and programming process; and

WHEREAS, the MPO provides local direction for urban transportation planning and the allocation of federal transportation funds to entities within the region; and

WHEREAS, Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act and subsequent Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act require the implementation of Performance Measures to assist in the transportation planning process; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has adopted its Strategic Highway Safety Plan, a data-driven statewide-coordinated safety plan to help reduce fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads; and

WHEREAS, TxDOT has established targets for five Safety Performance measures for year 2020 as follows:

- 1. Number of Fatalities: 4,068
- 2. Rate of Fatalities per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT): 1.48
- 3. Number of Serious Injuries: 18,602
- 4. Rate of Serious Injuries per 100 million VMT: 6.56
- 5. Number of Non-Motorized Fatalities and Serious Injuries: 2,477; and

WHEREAS, the Alamo Area MPO previously took action supporting TxDOT's statewide safety targets for 2018 and 2019.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Alamo Area MPO hereby supports TxDOT's statewide safety targets for year 2020.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Alamo Area MPO supports TxDOT's visionary goals to end traffic fatalities on Texas roads by year 2050 and reduce fatal crashes by half by year 2035.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Alamo Area MPO will plan and program projects that contribute to the accomplishments of said targets and goals.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Alamo Area MPO will monitor the established targets and goals and report achievements to the Transportation Policy Board in Fall 2020.

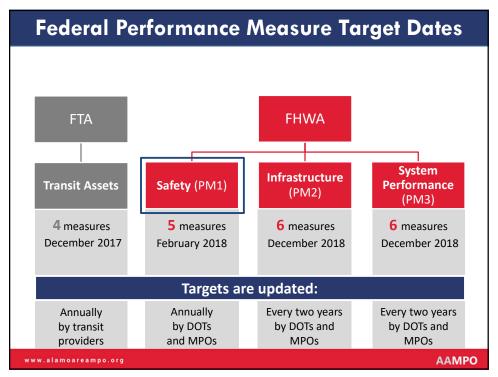

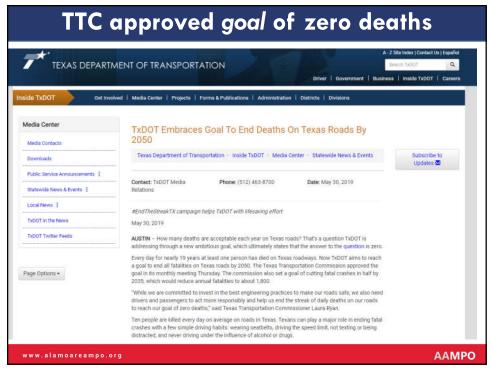

- Targets aim to reduce rising trends
 2% by 2022 and maintain declining trends
 - Achieved through an annual 0.4% reduction

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TxDOT set aside \$600 million for safety projects over two years

- TTC approved \$600 million over two years in the 2020 Unified Transportation Program (UTP) for statewide safety improvements that:
 - straighten roads
 - improve lighting
 - upgrade guardrails
 - provide intersection improvements
 - and make safety improvements for bicyclists and pedestrians

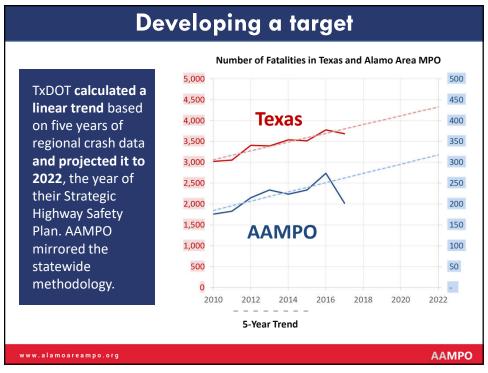
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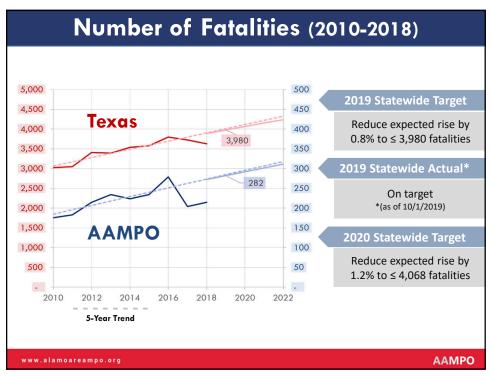
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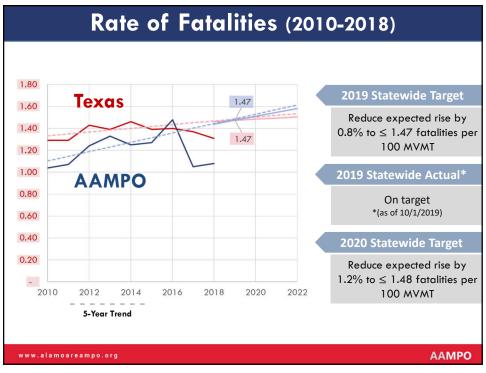
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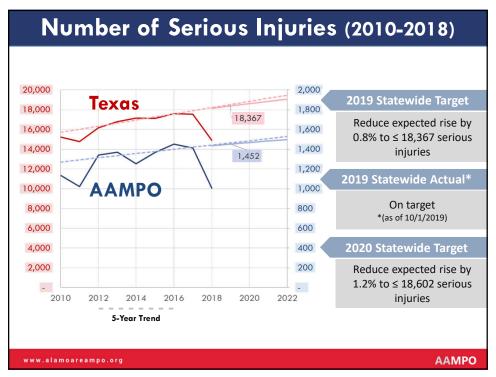

6. Action on a Resolution Supporting the FY 2021 Unified Transportation Program Project Scoring and Prioritization

Purpose

The purpose of this agenda item is to take action on a resolution supporting the FY 2021 Unified Transportation Program (UTP) project scoring and prioritization project process.

Issue

The UTP is a ten-year planning document that is developed annually and is approved by the Texas Transportation Commission. The UTP authorizes highway and other projects for construction, development and planning. The UTP is neither a budget nor a guarantee that projects will or can be built. However, it is a critical tool in guiding transportation project development within the long-range planning context.

A multiagency workgroup met twice (September 9 and October 21) to provide direction on the project scoring and prioritization process.

This item was resented at your December meeting and the presentation from that meeting is attached for your information.

TAC unanimously recommended approval of the attached resolution.

Action Requested

A motion to approve the resolution supporting the FY 2021 Unified Transportation Program project scoring process and ranking of projects.



A Resolution In Support of the Region's Scoring and Ranking of Projects for the FY 2021 Unified Transportation Program DRAFT

WHEREAS, pursuant to federal law, the Governor of the State of Texas designated the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (AAMPO) as the Metropolitan Planning Organization for the San Antonio region; and

WHEREAS, AAMPO's Transportation Policy Board is the entity for cooperative decision-making regarding regional transportation issues in Bexar, Comal, and Guadalupe Counties and a portion of Kendall County; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is a valuable partner in planning for and implementing the region's mobility needs; and

WHEREAS, TxDOT's Unified Transportation Program (UTP) is a 10-year planning guide for transportation project development and construction that is updated annually; and

WHEREAS, the 2021 UTP includes projects funded using Category 2 Metro Corridor Projects, Category 4 Statewide Connectivity Corridor Projects, and Category 12 Strategic Priority and Clear Lanes Projects; and

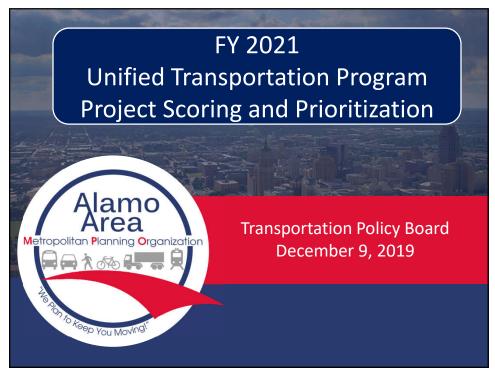
WHEREAS, TxDOT's Transportation Planning and Programming Division has requested MPOs and TxDOT Districts collaboratively score and rank Category 2, 4 and 12 projects that are proposed for inclusion in the 2021 UTP; and

WHEREAS, the projects shown in the attached list:

- are consistent with previously identified priorities
- have been technically scored and ranked
- are included in the AAMPO's conforming Transportation Improvement Program and / or Metropolitan Transportation Plan; and
- have been supported through the AAMPO's public involvement process

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organization's Transportation Policy Board approves the ranking of projects in the attached list.

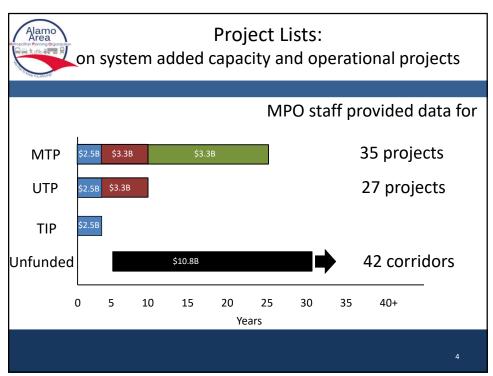


FY 2021 Unified Transportation Program

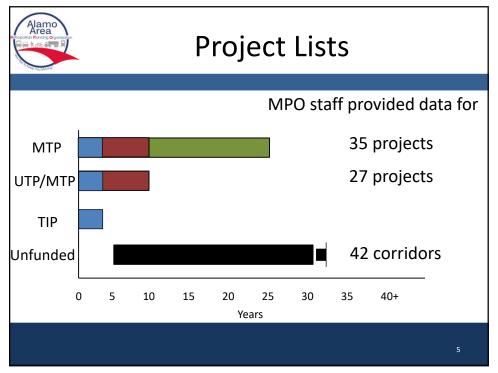

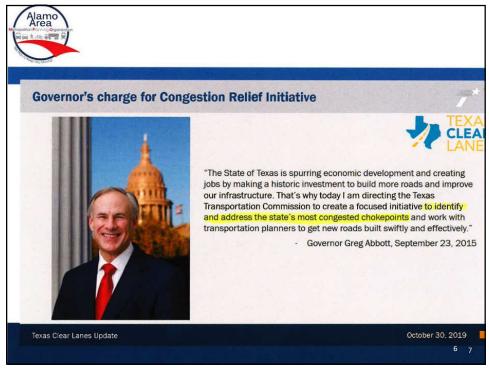

8. Discussion and Appropriate Action on Amendments to the FY 2020-2021 Unified Planning Work Program

Purpose

The purpose of this agenda item is to take action on amendments to the FY 2020-2021 Unified Planning Work Program.

Issue

In January, after the previous fiscal year has been closed out, the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is amended to reflect carryover dollar amounts for individual subtasks (studies). Two studies were carried over from FY 2019 to FY 2020: Subtask 3.2 New Braunfels Transit Study and Subtask 4.3 Travel Demand Model Updates. The unspent STBG amount for Subtask 5.2 Alamo Commutes Program has also been carried over to FY 2020. The studies and program that are being carried over are bringing their unspent funding with them.

Additionally, VIA Metropolitan Transit has requested to revise the text for Subtask 4.4 Rapid Transit Corridor Study in the FY 2020-2021 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The study is funded through STP-MM funding and was selected in the call for projects for the FY 2019-2022 Transportation Improvement Program. The \$10M Rapid Transit Corridor Study cost was allocated from the \$20M previously targeted for the Austin-San Antonio Passenger Rail Project.

The revised pages of the UPWP are attached. Deleted text is struck through and added information is underlined. Amendments are designated with a footnote of '1'.

Subtask 3.2 New Braunfels Transit Study 1

3.2.1 This project is a third party contract for a consultant to study fixed route transit service in the City of New Braunfels. Currently, demand response transit service is available, however, with increased population and employment growth, formal study of multimodal transportation solutions is necessary. The study scope of work will include identification of potential routes (including connectivity to San Antonio, Seguin, Schertz/Cibolo, and current and proposed park and carpool facilities); projected ridership levels; passenger amenity packages; potential street improvements; capital costs; operating costs; funding sources; cost/benefit analyses; and phasing of implementation. The study will also consider service to the disability community, discuss emerging technologies, and include a proactive public involvement component. This study is supported by both the City of New Braunfels' Comprehensive Plan and VIA Metropolitan Transit's 2040 Vision Plan.

Subtask 3.3 Air Quality Planning

3.3.1 The purpose of this Subtask is to provide technical analysis for air quality planning in the region. MPO staff is responsible for transportation conformity as outlined under Subtask 3.1.4. Tasks that will be performed by AACOG staff under this Subtask may include refining the photochemical model as new data becomes available; conducting photochemical model runs; conducting trend analyses; conducting model sensitivity tests; identifying, evaluating and recommending on-road control measures; and updating emissions inventories. This type of work for on-road sources has been invaluable and the region desires to continue investing in this analysis. Should the region require a photochemical model, AACOG desires to conduct the work with oversight by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). The work will be guided by local and State agencies and will be designed to meet Environmental Protection Agency defined standards for reliability and accuracy. Work performed under this subtask will not duplicate tasks being conducted by TCEQ nor the Texas A&M Transportation Institute. It must be noted that for air quality planning, the area outside the metropolitan area boundary affects the area within the metropolitan area boundary.

Subtask 4.2 Mobility 2050 Demographics and Travel Demand Model Update

4.2.1 This project is a third party contract for a consultant to assist with the following tasks: 1) demographic development for Mobility 2050; 2) development of a new mode choice model based on VIA Metropolitan Transit's latest travel survey; 3) calibration of the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organization model based on the latest travel surveys and 2020 census data as appropriate; 4) development of a master travel demand model network system; 5) integration of the AAMPO and CAMPO travel demand models and networks for an integrated approach to regional travel; 6) collection of parking usage and cost data to update the travel demand model and 7) ongoing modeling support.

Subtask 4.3 Travel Demand Model Updates ¹

The current travel demand model area covers all of Bexar, Comal, Guadalupe, Kendall and Wilson Counties. The modeling region is expected to expand to include Atascosa and Medina counties. A new series of traffic counts, travel surveys and a transit on-board travel survey have been completed or are expected to be underway during the two-year timeframe of the UPWP. The MPO also plans for the selected consultant to provide assistance with roadway and transit network coding, peak hour modeling, explore integrating the AAMPO and CAMPO travel demand models, calibrating and validating the 2015 base year models. The consultant will also assist with specific testing such as high capacity transit improvements, bicycle facilities, and recommendations from the Regional Thoroughfare Plan Study.

Subtask 4.4 Rapid Transit Corridor Study 1

4.4.1 The purpose of this study is two-fold: 1) a consultant will study rapid transit in the northeast corridor of Bexar County. This corridor connects to the Randolph Park & Ride and will tie to future improvements to IH 35 between San Antonio and Austin; 2) the consultant will study other rapid transit corridors that connect to the northeast corridor and are strategically located to support the population and employment growth of San Antonio. The SA Tomorrow and VIA's 2040 Vision Plan established system level needs which will require the transformation for arterial corridors to better accommodate multimodal transportation.

The purpose of this study is to enable VIA to hire a consultant to perform advanced project definition for up to 6 rapid transit corridors (East, West, South, Northwest, Northcentral and Northeast) connecting large regional activity centers identified in the City of San Antonio's SA Tomorrow plan. The identified corridors represent the full build out of VIA's high-capacity transit network and are strategically located to support the population growth of the San Antonio region. The Advanced Rapid Transit advanced project definition will place the agency in a position to enter the Project Development process in the Capital Investments Grant Program. The type of work expected to be tasked includes conceptual plan development, traffic impacts analysis.

Subtask 5.2 Alamo Commutes Program ¹

5.2.1 The purpose of the Alamo Commutes program is to reduce the frequency of single occupancy vehicle trips in order to improve regional air quality. This includes the promotion of more sustainable modes of transportation including carpool, vanpool, public transit, walking, biking and alternative scheduling. Alamo Commutes works with employers and the community to provide the tools, resources and information needed to encourage smart commuting habits. 9. Action on the FY 2019 Annual Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Report

Purpose

The purpose of this agenda item is to accept the Annual Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) report which documents participation in the MPO's consultant contracts.

Issue

In September 1989, the MPO Transportation Policy Board established a DBE goal of 25% for all consultant contracts.

In January 1998, this goal was reviewed and the MPO Director was given authorization to manage the MPO's DBE participation goal for individual contracts so that the overall DBE participation meets or exceeds 25%. It was also agreed that an annual update would be provided to the Transportation Policy Board.

In January 2003 it was agreed that the annual report will reflect a rolling five-year average.

As indicated on the attached FY 2019 report, the MPO's actual DBE participation for consultant contracts is 35%, 10 percentage points higher than the established goal.

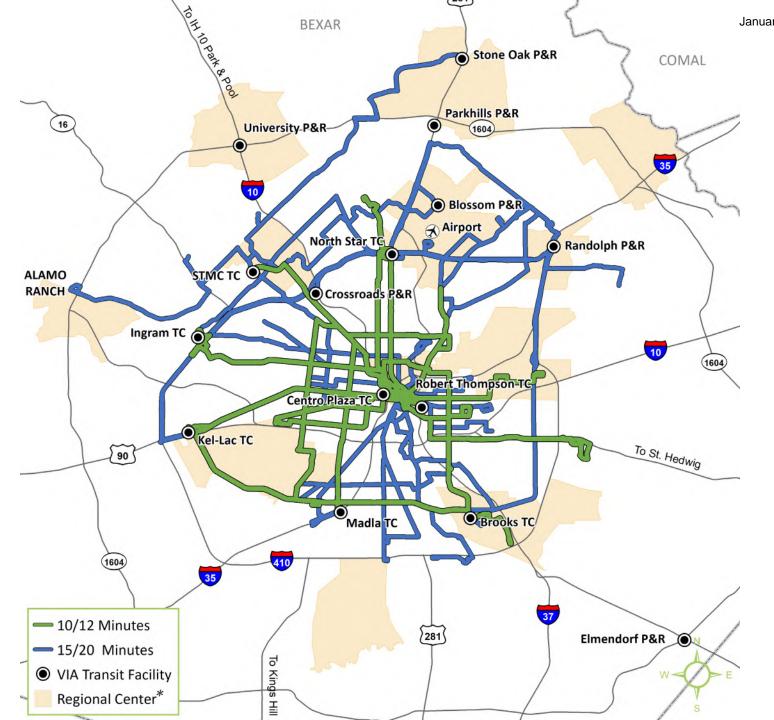

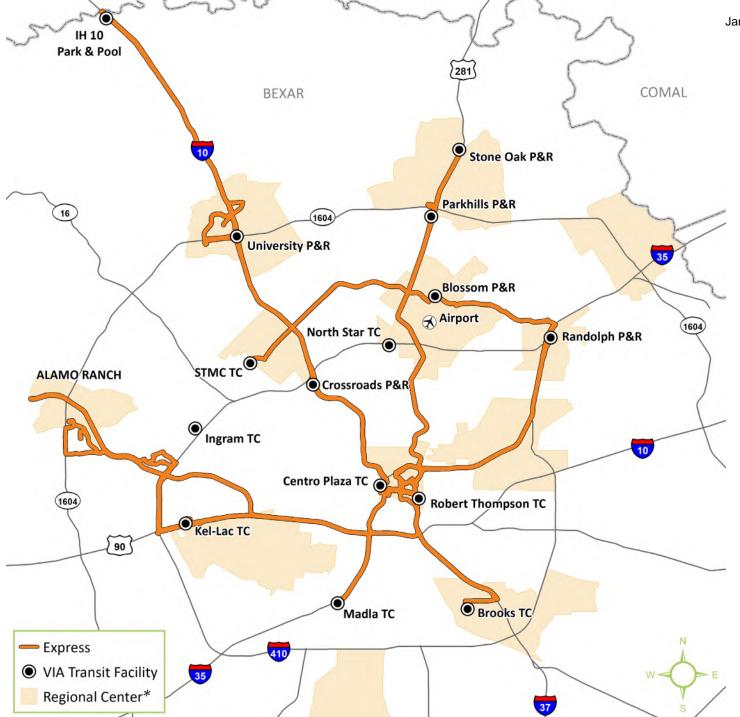

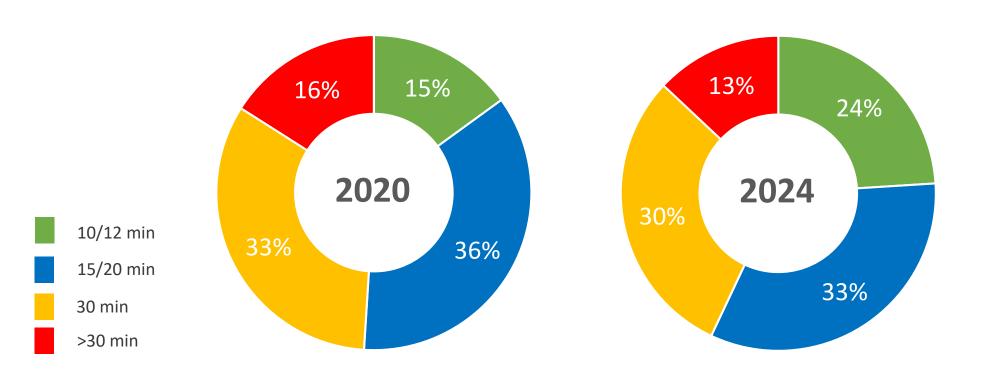
